Course Description: Today much of the discussion surrounding health care is focused on access to health care and health insurance; quality of care; health care technology, health policy reform; and health care costs. This course presents a conceptual and substantial overview of the social, cultural, and historical foundations of health care and health professions in the United States as well as a global perspective on health care.

Following the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the development of medical sociology;
- Identify how the system of health care and health professions has changed over time;
- Assess the important social factors on the structure of health care industry, health care policy and the distribution of health care;
- Discover and develop their own sociological imagination and apply it to societal issues;
- Develop communication skills through online discussions, presentations, and written assignments.

Weekly reaction papers: These will be over your textbook readings, as well as any additional assigned readings.

Weekly discussion posts: Each week you will be responsible for discussion posts. You must follow all instructions in Canvas to receive full credit for your posts. DO NOT wait until Friday to complete the discussion posts, as you will be required to respond to two of your classmates.

Quizzes: Quizzes are assigned in Week 5 and Week 12. Quizzes are open-book and open-note. Even though quizzes are open-book and open-note, you still need to study the material in preparation. The quizzes are timed (120 minutes) and consist of essay questions, multiple choice, true/false, definitions, and

fill-in-the-blank questions. The material for the quizzes comes from the readings, activities, and any videos we may watch.

Final Projects: You will have two final projects to complete for the semester. The requirements for the final projects are available at the beginning of the class, and are due the final week of class. You may complete them and turn them in at any point in the semester. Details are available in Canvas.

Exams: Exams are open-book and open-note. Even though quizzes are open-book and open-note, you still need to study the material in preparation. The exams are timed (180 minutes) and consist of essay questions, multiple choice, true/false, definitions, and fill-in-the-blank questions.
